## Learning M orse Code

## EASY PARTS:

- Learning letters, abbreviations, and numbers is relatively easy.
- Tapping letters and numbers with a key or by hand is also easily learned.


## NOT SO EASY PARTS:

- Dot/Dash spacing for forming coherent words .
- Word spacing for producing identifiable sentences/message s.
- Developing a steady pace with clean error free code.

HARD PART:

- Receiving/interpreting code is very difficult at first.
- Identifying characters by sound (not dots/dashes) is the goal.


This takes a lot of time and practice. (I'm 6 months in and am just getting comfortable at receiving 10-13 WPM)

- Morse Code uses a code within a code -- Abbreviations are the norm. You learn the characters, but you also MUST learn the abbreviation conventions.
